Youth violence intervention unit

On May 25, early intervention PCSOs Corbishley and Matthews took part in a 5K at Sixfields Stadium to support a young raising money for charity person in 'StreetVet' as part of their early intervention programme. They raised £337 for the charity, helping the young person to focus their energy on positive outcomes. The Early Intervention Team works with eight to 17-year-olds who have become involved in a serious violence offence (including sexual offences), as well as those who show concern relating to knife crime, gangs, drug crime and violence. Referrals to the Early Intervention Team can be made by both the police and external agencies such as schools and social workers. The role of an Early Intervention PCSO is crucial in positively influencing the lives of the young person and their families, dissuading them from future violent behaviours and criminality. This, in turn, contributes to the enhancement of our communities and a reduction in the demand placed on our organisation in dealing with Serious Violence.

We made a commitment to make a change to the Highfield area in Kettering. Our approach has been based on what local people told us concerned them most in their neighbourhood, as well as local crime statistics and information from our partners (such as the local council). Kettering NPT have conducted various patrols around the Highfield estate and surrounding streets with a view of detecting crime and reassuring the public. On May 8, officers observed two suspicious males in balaclavas who when seeing police, attempted to evade. These two males were detained and found one of the males to be in possession of a lockable flick knife and cannabis, and the second male in possession of cannabis. Both were subsequently arrested and will face charges/court appearance. We want to assure the community we will continue to tackle crimes of this type with a zero tolerance approach. Street Watch

Northamptonshire Street Watch enables local people to take an active role in keeping their community safe by patrolling their neighbourhood as part of an organised scheme, identifying potential issues, and engaging with local residents encouraging them to report things like antisocial behaviour, vandalism, and suspicious behaviour to the police. The scheme is based on a simple idea. It's about going for a walk with your neighbours, being a visible presence to help deter crime and antisocial behaviour, and building a greater sense of community spirit. As a member, you will patrol your local area alongside one of your neighbours for at least two hours every month, at times which suit you. You'll engage with people and encourage them to take an active interest in keeping your area safe wearing a high-visibility Street Watch jacket. You will be able to organise your own walks, when and where you want to, and you can even walk your dog at the same time. It is up to you and your group how much or how little you want to do. Street Watch is for the community, by the community, but you will be supported by your local neighbourhood team as much as possible. Anyone who would like to get involved or set up a Street Watch scheme in their area is encouraged to email us. Street Watch is part of our Citizens in policing initiative. We will then put you in contact with a local officer to discuss your involvement.
